### Principal's Message

### Parent Representative Group Meeting

The next PRG meeting is scheduled for Tuesday the 24th of May at 6pm in the Year 6 classroom. The meeting will be divided into two parts. The first session will be led by Mr Munday sharing and explaining the newly formatted Student Reports. As I shared with our community in previous newsletters, our students reports were decommissioned so we have been working on formatting new student reports. I encourage parents to attend this meeting as it is a great opportunity to ask questions and view the new look student reports. We welcome any feedback from our parents. Following this we will continue with our Term 2 PRG meeting. The meeting will conclude at 7pm. If you have any items for the agenda please contact the office. ### A Focus on Learning

Deep Learning has been the focus here at Holy Family for many years. For deep learning to occur, many elements need to be in play. Students need to want to learn. This means that they must be curious about the world around them, think creatively and critically about what they see and hear and collaborate with others to see different perspectives. Students need to see themselves as active and empowered learners and problem solvers not just passive participants. The way teachers organise the learning pathways for our children is based on this thinking. Students are collaborators in the planning and direction of their learning- inquiry learning- What do I want to know about this topic? Who else is interested in this? How can we work together using our strengths to really understand and critically reflect on this information gathered? How can we creatively and effectively share this knowledge with others?

Just as we are developing these important learning dispositions with all our students, our teachers are also focused on learning better ways to assist the learning needs of the students in their care. We model that learning is lifelong and that teachers are also learners.

This term the focus has been on developing effective skills and strategies to target the literacy needs of the students especially in the area of spelling. Teaching spelling in the context of reading and writing. The days of spelling list on a Monday and test on Friday is long gone. This technique only really focused on short term memory and WHAT we are spelling. The focus needs to be on HOW we spell. These skills teach our students to use knowledge of words to be efficient problem solvers.

### Principal's Message

The follow is information for parents to ponder regarding what do we need to be thinking about when we are spelling or understanding words. The following information is taken from Education Leader in this area, **Christine Topfer.** 

### Sound - focusing on sound

Students need to be made aware that they can write many words by thinking about the sounds in the word. This gives possible spellings but it must be confirmed by 'does it look right?' (visual appearance) or analysing the meaning parts of the word.

#### Visual – focusing on the look of words

An awareness that you can write some words by thinking about the way they look is a useful strategy to develop. For example, clusters of letters appear in predictable patterns in words, and words or word parts keep a visual relationship to other words having similar meaning such as sign, signature.

### Meaning – thinking about word meanings

Thinking about the structure of words and their meaning, and developing an awareness of the meaning patterns in words will assist students write many words.

### Connecting - making connections with other words

You can use what you know about one word to work out a new word. The use of the connection strategy is often referred to as spelling by analogy or developing a mental dictionary. It involves the ability to manipulate and think about words. It includes thinking about how you figure out what to do when you want to spell an unknown word, then checking to see if it worked. Making connections between words enhances students' ability to apply their word knowledge in different contexts across the curriculum.

Checking – making use of other resources: live, print and electronic You can write some words by referring to charts or word walls created from topic words, high frequency words or words with common letter patterns. Dictionaries and other print resources provide a good source for checking spelling. People are also useful resources for supporting word attempts as are electronic spell checkers.

**Effective spellers** are ones who are aware of when they don't know how to spell a word and consciously **know a variety of strategies** such as sound, visual, meaning, connecting and checking in order to write a word accurately. From the earliest age **students need to learn strategies effective spellers use to write new words** as they learn about the sound, visual and meaning structures of the language.

### **School Banking**

A school banking service is available to students who hold Commonwealth Dollarmites or Youth Saver accounts. Encouraging children to make small regular deposits to a bank account helps them to develop good savings habits and awareness of the value of money. Students who wish to deposit money should bring bank books (with the deposit slip filled in) and money to school on Tuesday morning. The deposits are processed on Thursday during the morning and the bank books returned to students by their class teacher. Please note that we are unable to process cheques.
