Dear Parents and Friends of Holy Family,

On Friday 8th August we celebrate Mary MacKillop and the mission of the Sisters of St. Joseph. This is very important for us as a school founded by the Sisters of St. Joseph. We should be very proud of our connection to Mary MacKillop her vision brought alive here at Holy Family. If not for Mary MacKillop, our school would not have much of its special character, traditions and practices.

It is important that as time goes on, we continue to keep alive the story of Mary MacKillop and the Sisters of St Joseph.

How then did they come to be the foundation of our school?

- 1938 Catholic education began in Granville when on 2nd February two Sisters of St. Joseph started St. Joseph's Convent School. This school began in an old hall on the corner of Hudson St. & The Trongate.
- 1946 Holy Family parish declared as a parish in its own right— now separated from Holy Trinity, Granville.
- 1952 St. Joseph's Convent School is renamed Holy Family Primary School when it moves out of the hall, into permanent buildings (our current Yr 1 & Library building).
- 1987 Sisters of St. Joseph conclude their leadership of our school.

How do we keep alive the story and mission of Mary MacKillop?

- Celebrating the Feast of Mary MacKillop on the 8th August allows us to tell her story to the children, to celebrate her mission and to give thanks to God for her life and work.
- Each part of our school has on display a portrait of Mary MacKillop, symbolising that she remains present in all of us, and in the life of our school.
- Our Junior Joeys group ensures that as a school community we continue to work for those in the world that need help and justice.
- Each year we award fourteen students the Mary MacKillop Award for living their faith through word and deed.
- From 2015 we will be renaming our school sport houses, and one of these will be known as MacKillop.

Mary MacKillop founded the Sisters of St. Joseph on the belief of "Never see a need without doing something about it". Today we are called to continue to keep this alive in our school, our Church and our country. By living this mission we are honouring all those who worked so hard to give us all that we have here at Holy Family today.

Religious Education Matters



On Thursday evening many of the children in Year 3 will be making their first Sacrament of Reconciliation. This Sacrament helps us build our relationship with God and prepare us to receive our First Holy Communion later in the year. To prepare for their Sacrament of Reconciliation, Year 3 students have been attending special classes where they have been learning about the importance of Reconciliation. Here are some things that they have learnt:

"Reconciliation is important because you tell the priest about what bad choices you have made, and if you are really sorry, he will pray to God and ask for God to forgive you." – *Marko*

"I am looking forward to my Reconciliation because I get to talk to the priest. I will tell him some of the sins I have done, and then I will get blessed and be forgiven by God." – *Nicholas*

Parent Representative Group

The 2014 PRG Members are:

This group will meet with Mrs Guilfoyle on a regular basis to discuss matters that are important within our school, or that are currently having an impact on school life. Key matters discussed last week included:

<u>School Uniform:</u> Concerns over the number of families not following school guidelines on school uniforms including wearing of the Winter tie, white sport shoes and inappropriate haircuts. The staff will continue to enforce these expectations and discussions will be held with parents and students who do not support school expectations.

<u>Internet Safety:</u> The school was congratulated on its handling of recent out of school, online safety concerns for our students when it was found that many students had illegal Instagram & Facebook accounts. While this is a parent matter, the school was applauded for informing parents of the quidelines and concerns.

<u>Trongate Parking</u>: The matter of overcrowded after-school parking in The Trongate was again raised as an issue. Mrs Guilfoyle shared that Parramatta Council Traffic Management reviewed this situation in 2010 & 2011 and there is nothing extra that we can do. We do not have enough street space between the pedestrian crossing, the driveway, the disabled parking and the Hudson St roundabout, to install a Kiss & Drop Zone.

Parking problems really come back to community courtesy - not parking out the front of the church for extended periods, not stopping in the bus zone or disabled parking area, and moving quickly from parking spots so that others may access these.



<u>Parent Helpers in the Classroom:</u> In Term 4, staff will be hoping for parents to assist in classroom and school programs. In preparation for this we will prepare information about required volunteer's child protection training and we will prepare a Parent Helpers' Code of Conduct to ensure that there are no misunderstandings about privacy and protocols.

<u>Sport Houses:</u> After discussion amongst the staff, a proposal was put to the PRG to rename our school sport houses so that they represent important parts of our school history. The PRG are in favour of this proposal, and from 2015 our school sport houses will be known as:

BLUE: MACKILLOP - after Mary MacKillop
GREEN: STACK - after Fr Stack PP 1976-2014
RED: MARTIN - after Fr Martin PP 1961-1975

GOLD: KERRIGAN - after Fr Kerrigan, our first PP, 1946-1961

In choosing these names, we will honour the foundation and building of our school by our three parish priests, and the legacy of Mary MacKillop's Sisters of St Joseph who worked beside priests and parishioners in building Holy Family.


Feast of Anne & Joachim
