- Take time to ask your children about the best part of their day. They want to know that you are interested in their learning.


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

Year 6 Canberra Trip

Australian Government Assistance for National Capitol Excursion

Students from our school have recently undertaken an educational tour of the national capitol. While on this tour they participated in a variety of educational programs focused on Australia's history, culture, heritage and democracy.

The Australian Government recognises the importance of all young Australians being able to visit their national capitol as part of their civics and citizen education. To assist you (the parent) in meeting the cost of the excursion the Australian Government is contributing funding of \$20 per eligible student under the Parliament and Civics Education Rebate (PACER) program toward the travel expenses incurred. This contribution will be paid directly to the school upon completion of the excursion.

War Memorial

Year Six recently went to Canberra and visited the War Memorial, which was a highly educational experience. We initially went into the Discovery Room to have a "hands on" experience of what is was like in the trenches and on a warship. While exploring the War Memorial, we learnt a lot about the history of our Australian military and their efforts and involvement in various wars. We learnt of their sufferings and difficulties that they endured while they were defending our country. We were able to see an information video on the war in Afghanistan, the Vietnam war and the war against Japan. While we were looking at the different war exhibitions, we saw many objects that were used in those wars including planes, submarines and helicopters. To end our wonderful trip of the War Memorial, we went to pay our respect to the Unknown Soldier, and to remember those who fought for our country. "Lest we forget" is what we say to remember those who fought for our country.

Australian Institute of Sport

Yr 6 arrived at the Australian Institute of Sport at 7:30pm. The first part of our visit was to Sportex, the interactive sport facility, with our guide Joe. His specialty sport was soccer. Some of the sports in the interactive facility were wheelchair basketball, rock climbing, soccer shootout and canoeing, just to mention a few.

Following that, our guide then took us to other training areas such as the swimming pool, the gymnastic centre and the gymnasium where we saw the women's volleyball team training. We found this experience very entertaining because they we so tall and extremely skilled.

Electoral Education Centre

On our Year 6 excursion to Canberra, one of the places we visited was the Electoral Education Centre. There we watched a short film about how democracy started in Australia. In the presentation, they used holograms of people to tell the story in 3D. Following that, we went to another display room where we were able to answer questions about how the voting system works. These were very fascinating activities.

Next, we were involved in a role-play that allowed us experience how preferential voting works. We realised how important our voting system is and why everyone should enrol to have a voice.

Ouestacon

During our amazing trip to Canberra, we were lucky enough to visit Questacon. Our time at Questacon was fun and a rich educational experience for all Year 6 students. When we arrived at Questacon, we went to an area mainly focused on water activities. What really caught our eye was the brilliant water exhibition, which was located in the entrance. Out of all the activities, we enjoyed the Drop Slide and the Earthquake House the most. The Drop Slide involves holding onto a bar and when you let go, you drop down a steep slide vertically until you slide down coming to a horizontal stop. The Earthquake House gave us a chance to experience an earthquake with the magnitude of 5.5 on the Richter Scale. Overall, we had a rich learning experience and a fantastic time at Questacon.

Old Parliament House

When we arrived at the Australian Museum of Democracy in the Old Parliament House, we had to wear fancy white gloves so that the oil from our fingers did not stick to the old materials and fabrics. We first visited the Discovery Room to learn about how early democracy was established in Australia. While we were in the Discovery Room, we had to answer a series of questions about our government using touch screens. We learned about our new Governor General, Sir Peter Cosgrove, and the importance of his role as the Queen's representative.

Parliament House

The third and most amazing place Year 6 attended in Canberra was the New Parliament House. We went to see the Senate and the House of Representatives. While we were in the Senate and the House of Representatives, we were asked many fascinating questions which were related to these two chambers. In the House of Representatives, a bill is discussed by the members and then passed on to the Senate where eventually it may become a law. We got to do a role-play where all students were involved in making this happen. We saw lots of portraits of Prime Minsters and learnt a lot about how parliament works.
